


Rose Queen's Float — "Famous Firsts in Flowers"


GRAND PRIZE










"FIRST IN BEAUTY" - City of Long Beach the picture colleges of the









National Orange Show







colors in flowers. Real Indio dates are suspended from the date trees while 20,000 vanda orchids form the leaves. Jeaniene Cook, 1956 Indio Date Festival Queen, portrays Queen Scheherazade; two princesses and slave girls serve Luke Christiansen as Caliph.




"See America First." A floral highway of white connects the four panels which represent East, South-Midwest, Rocky Mts., California, all created in thousands of colorful blossoms.

State of Oregon







The Publisher of the Pasadena Tournament of Roses Pictorial takes pleasure in saluting Max Colwell, an able executive and a fine friend.


RECORD CROWD VIEWS 68th ROSE PARADE







Tournament of Roses Themes, Facts, Rose Bowl Scores...

Since 1927, when the "theme plan" went into effect, the Tournament of Roses has gained in stature, beauty and ingenuity, culminating with the 1957 theme: Famous Firsts in Flowers.

Themes to date have been: 1927—"Songs in Flowers," 1928—"States and Nations in Flowers," 1929—"Poems in Flowers," 1930—"Festival Day in Flowers," 1931—"Dreams in Flowers," 1932—"Nations and Games in Flowers," 1933—"Fairytales in Flowers," 1934—"Tales of the Seven Seas," 1935—"Golden Legends," 1936—"History in Flowers," 1937—"Romance in Flowers," 1938—"Playland Fantasies," 1939—"Golden Memories in Flowers," 1940—"Twentieth Century in Flowers," 1941—"America in Flowers," 1942—"The Americas," 1943—"We're in to Win," 1944—"Memories of the Past—A Challenge to the Future," 1945—"Hold a Victory so Hardly Won," 1946—"Victory, Unity and Peace in Flowers," 1947—"Holidays in Flowers," 1948—"Our Golden West," 1949—"Childhood Memories," 1950—"Our American Heritage," 1951—"Joyful Living," 1952—"Dreams of the Future," 1953—"Melodies in Flowers," 1954—"Famous Books in Flowers," 1955—"Familiar Sayings in Flowers," 1956—"Pages from the Ages," and for 1957—"Famous Firsts in Flowers."

It was in 1889 that Dr. Charles Frederick Holder, world traveler, submitted his idea of a Tournament of Roses to the Valley Hunt Club. The thought was to have an event to celebrate the fact that flowers in bloom and luxuriant sunshine were the order of the day in Pasadena and Southern California on New Years Day, while most of the country is covered in a blanket of ice and snow. The first parade was held in 1890 and consisted mostly of flower decorated carriages and surreys.

The Tournament of Roses Association was founded in 1931 and is operated on a permanent, business-like basis and requires the efforts of hundreds of Pasadena's civic-minded citizens all year.

Floats are constructed of wood, metal and wire frames and are decorated the night before the parade. Only fresh flowers are permitted.

Football games permanently replaced the original chariot games, in 1916, although the first grid encounter took place in 1902.

The first game played in the Rose Bowl was in 1923.

The Rose Bowl, seating over 100,000 persons, is located in the Arroyo Seco, with the towering San Gabriel Mountains forming the picturesque backdrop.

In the 42 games from 1902 through 1956, the Eastern or Southern visitors to the Rose Bowl classic won 21, Pacific Coast Conference teams won 18, and two were tied. The 1918 and 1919 games were between service teams.

Receipts of the Rose Bowl game are divided into thirds: Visitors, Pacific Coast Conference team, Tournament of Roses Association.

The parade is arranged in divisions, floats being grouped according to population of cities represented and into other classifications covering entries by clubs and organizations.

Principal prize of the Tournament of Roses is the Sweepstakes Award, given to the most beautiful entry, regardless of size. All entrants, except classes D and E (hotels, business firms and manufacturers) and Pasadena entries are eligible for this prize.

Theme Prize is second most important award. It is given to the float which most fittingly presents the Parade's theme. Except for those entries from Pasadena, it is open to all.

Grand Prize, third most important, is given to the most beautiful float in Divisions D and E.

Parade winners are determined by judges who visit each float from time construction is started. "New fangled gasoline buggies" were not permitted to invade the parade line-up until 1905, when after much debate they were allowed—but only at the rear of the parade so as not to frighten horses pulling floats.

Tournament Traffic Control Headed by Chief C. H. Morris

Popularity of Pasadena's Tournament of Roses is reflected in the fact that in 1938, when Chief of Police C. H. Morris first took charge, traffic control plans of its Police Department were pri-



marily concerned with only 130,000 autos and 500,000 persons on New Year's Day for the Parade, Rose Bowl grid classic and Santa Anita Race Track

Today, under capable supervision of Chief Morris, more than 500,000 automobiles and 1,750,000 persons are guided in and out of Pasadena on New Year's.

Chief Morris' master plan of traffic control involves the coordinated assistance of California State Highway Patrol, Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, Los Angeles Police Department and Police departments of surrounding cities. Participating are 1,375 officers, 44 police cars, 79 motorcycles. Of these, 1125 men and 64 vehicles are employed by Pasadena, for the day.

Chief Morris this-year used one of Sheriff Eugene Biscailuz's helicopters, with two-way radio control, to effect maximum traffic movement. (Photos taken aid in following year's work).

That Chief Morris is an expert in this, as well as other police problems, is attested by some 50 awards, including a national trophy for Traffic Education and Traffic Control.

A 1950 graduate of the National Academy F.B.I., Washington, D.C., he is an International Association Chiefs of Police committeeman; League of California Cities director; a past president Los Angeles County Police Officer Association. Weekly his department conducts Pasadena's KWKW traffic quiz program.
