> The library itself will be constructed of reinforced concrete with a special sun screen of porcelain enameled aluminum designed to shade Figueroa St. windows. Bicycle racks will be provided at the corner of the lot closest to the Figueroa and Piedmont intersection.

The new library, in addition to more modern conveniences, figures to have approximately 20,-000 more volumes added to its present book collection, making a total of about 50,000. The new book costs will amount to \$60,-

Mrs. Emma Linsenmayer, branch librarian, and Mrs. Lillian Nicholas, Central-Northeast Regional Librarian, both expressed satisfaction at the new branch plans and said that Highland Park area citizens will have a much greater selection of library materials in a more pleasant at-

mosphere. While the library is under construction, patrons are urged to use the nearby Lincoln Heights, Eagle Rock, El Sereno, and Richard Henry Dana branches. The entire project is being financed by a \$6,400,000 branch library bond issue approved in 1957.
