


## Ends after 50 years



THE DAY THE BOWLING ENDED — It's proud tradition of 50 years has ended. The lawn bowling greens at Arroyo Seco Park will now be converted by the city into tennis courts. The greens were once the site of national tournaments and were built for the 1932 Olympics. In the last few years, only one of the four courts was kept in repair and the club members played their last games Jan. 9.
