Born January 12, 1876, in Knoxville, Iowa,
Robert L. Burns in early childhood moved with
his family to Hutchinson, Kansas, where he re-
ceived his education. After studying law he
was admitted to the bar, April 1, 1896, when
twenty years old.
His career was varied by coal mining and
telephone business, flour milling and grain
industries. He acted as business manager of
the Hutchinson News, Vice-president of the
Congolidated Flour Mills Company, Wichita, he
served as manager to the Consolidated Branch
established on the Pacific Coast, 1915, with
headquarters in San Francisco and Los Angeles.
In 1923, Mr. Burns was elected to the Board
of Education, and served in that capacity for
six years. He ran for the City Council in
1929, was elected, and has been returned every
succeeding two years since.
At the present, 1936, he is president of
that body.
Traffic and Lighting, Finance, Public
Utilities, and special committees on rules,
have been Mr. Burns' particular interest in
the council.
