Peirson Hall was born in Armour, South Dakota, July 31, 1894. He attended two years of high school in Tecumseh, Nebraska and lived in a Nebraska orphanage for a time before moving to Los Angeles in 1912 determined to become a lawyer. After a one-year course of study at Polytechnic High School in Los Angeles, he attended the University of Southern California Night Law School from 1912-1916. He was admitted to the California Bar and began his law practice in 1916.

During his two terms on the Council, he fought successfully for a comprehensive traffic and street plan for the city and authored legislation regulating flying over the city and providing for the licensing of pilots. He ran unsuccessfully for City Attorney in 1929.

He married Gertrude May Engel in 1930, and they had two children.

He served on the City Council of Los Angeles from 1925-1929, was secretary of the Democratic State Central Committee in 1932, and became U. S. District Attorney for the Southern District of California in 1933. He was in charge of draft registration in Los Angeles from 1941-42, and Franklin D. Roosevelt appointed him to the Federal bench on February 18, 1942. He continued to serve as a Federal judge until the late 1970's, and was considered the foremost authority on aviation law among the nation's 500 Federal judges.
