





Tournament History

If it had not been for a shivering professor, a physician with a suggestion, and later, an army of volunteers, there never would have been a Tournament of Roses or a parade on the streets of Pasadena.

That might seem beyond comprehension—especially since plans are now being finalized for the staging of the Tournament's 87th festival on New Year's day, 1976. But it's a most accurate statement.

Following retirement, the shivering professor, Dr. Charles Frederick Holder, migrated from the east in the late 1800s. He had always spent New Year's day looking out the window at a blizzard.

Dr. Holder found his place in the warm sun of Pasadena where fresh flowers and fruits were in abundance. He also joined the local Valley Hunt Club, and in this association befriended the physician with a suggestion, Dr. F. F. Rowland. Both gentlemen convinced the Valley Hunt Club membership that they should show off Pasadena's climate and freshness with a parade on the first day of 1890.

Many names for this festival were suggested—among them "The Ripening of the Orange." However, Dr. Rowland and his wife had recently returned from Nice, France, and the "Battle of the Roses." At Dr. Rowland's suggestion, the planned parade became known as the "Tournament of Roses."

New Year's day, 1890, found the club parading through Pasadena with floral bedecked horses and buggies. The blooms were all picked from the members' gardens. The parade was a success, and soon others hearing of this fresh flower festival in winter, started migrating towards California. The event became so popular that it outgrew the Valley Hunt Club, which prompted the formation of what is now the Tournament of Roses.

Following in the tradition of Dr. Holder and Dr. Rowland, a volunteer army of 1,400 Tournament of Roses members spend 50,000 hours annually to assure that Pasadena's floral greetings to the world take place, as usual, every New Year's morning.

GRAND MARSHAL


Much has been written about the legendary singing career of Kate Smith—the universally beloved lady with the big heart and big voice. Perhaps former President Franklin Delano Roosevelt put it best when he said, "This is Kate Smith, this is America." On New Year's day, 1976, Miss Smith, who has combined a life long love for her country with an immense talent for song, will add still another dimension to a 44-year career when she leads the 87th Pasadena Tournament of Roses as Grand Marshal. The Greenville, Virginia, native is the third woman to be so honored by the Tournament. Mary Pickford was selected in 1933 with Shirley Temple as the Grand Marshal in 1939.

Kate Smith has introduced more than 700 songs that made the "Hit Parade," including "God Bless America," and is the recipient of 19 gold records, signifying sales of one million or more copies. She is also listed among the 10 most beloved women in the world.

Miss Smith has received in excess of 40,000,000 pieces of fan mail throughout her career.

Other than Miss Smith's theme song, "When the Moon Comes Over the Mountain," she is probably best known for the singing of "God Bless America," a song written and filed away by Irving Berlin, which she dusted off and sang for the first time on Armistice Day, 1938. Her career actually began at age eight when she entertained World War I troops in and around Washington, D.C.

Her "real career" debut came, most fittingly, on her 22nd birthday in 1931 with a weekday radio show. Since that time she has appeared regularly on television, in films, vaudeville, concerts, on Broadway, records, and even sang an aria for an opera.

PRESIDENT of the Tournament

To his friends, Ralph Sayre Helpbringer, President of the 87th Tournament of Roses, is affectionately known as "Speedy." That nickname accurately points up what type of year it's been as 29 committee units formulate plans for the Rose Parade's festive "Bicentennial Kickoff" to the nation on New Year's day, 1976.

"I've had an exciting year," said Helpbringer, who culminates 21 years of service to the Tournament on January 1. "Time has passed so quickly or speedily, but it's been a most enjoyable and active year for me."


Since he announced "America, Let's Celebrate!" as the theme of the 1976 parade, "Speedy" and his first lady, Betty, have been ambassadors of good will for both the Tournament of Roses and City of Pasadena.

More than 60,000 miles were consumed in travel this past spring as the Helpbringers visited nearly every out-of-state parade participant and each incoming 1976 band. Besides, Ralph has taken part in every major planning meeting on the parade.

Helpbringer has spent 30 of his 58 years in business and community service in Pasadena. He retired from the General Tire business many years ago, and is now Chairman of the Board of Universal Exhibits, which is headquartered in El Monte, California.

A native of Ohio, Helpbringer brought his wife and daughter, Lynne (now Mrs. Philip Pierpont III), to Pasadena in 1946. On New Year's day, the family and grandson, Philip IV, will greet a crowd of 1.5 million along the Rose Parade's 5½-mile route.

"Speedy" promises he won't tell his driver to break the speed limit. Why? A red light, siren and conversation with one of "Pasadena's Finest" officers earned him his famous nickname.









FLOAT JUDGES

Eighteen major Rose Parade prizes will be awarded by a respected and talented panel of three judges, selected to review the 61 floral entries in the 87th Tournament of Roses. In the daylight, at dusk, and even in the New Year's dawn, the judges, starting December 30, will crisscross the Pasadena area to insure that each float is visited and viewed at least three times before prize determinations are made shortly before the start of the parade. They are:

GEORGE T. AKIN, President of Universal Exhibits Display Projects in South El Monte, California, and a past president of Exhibit Designers and Producers Association of Southern California. Mr. Akin is a graduate of the USC School of Architecture in Industrial Design.

JOHN HENRY DUDLEY, Chairman of the Board of the 65-year-old John Henry Company, Lansing, Michigan, and a leader in the floriculture-horticulture industry. Mr. Dudley is a graduate of Michigan State University. He has seen the last 21 Rose Parades in person.

RONALD D. MIZIKER, Director, Entertainment Show Development for Disneyland and Walt Disney World. Mr. Miziker, a graduate of the University of New Mexico, is responsible for the staging of such Disney Classics as the Main Street Electrical Parade, Fantasy on Parade, America on Parade, and the opening of the Walt Disney World complex in Orlando, Florida.

JUDGES' SPECIAL—For float displaying the most humor.







THE ROSE PARADE PROLOGUE

The spirit of the 87th Tournament of Roses is captured in a stirring presentation from the 3d (3rd) U.S. Infantry Regiment of the United States Army.

Designated by the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration as the kick-off event of the nation's Bicentennial observance, the 1976 Rose Parade prologue will include (in order), "The Spirit of '76," a depiction of George Washington on horseback, the Color Guard, Commander-in-Chief's Guard and the Fife and Drum Corps.

The leading unit from the 3d Infantry is a personification of Archibald M. Willard's famous painting, "The Spirit of '76."

The marching fifer and drummers date to the Revolutionary War, and set the theme for the 1976 Parade, which is "America, Let's Celebrate!"

A soldier of the 3d Infantry is costumed in authentic reproductions of General Washington's attire as preserved in the Smithsonian Institution.

The Color Guard of the 3d Infantry Regiment bears the flags of the United States, the U.S. Army and the 3d Infantry Regiment. The 50 battle streamers, a valorous unit award and a meritorious unit citation (attached to the Regimental colors) attest to the unit's heroic past.

As a unit of the Military District of Washington, the 3d Infantry is charged with the dual mission of providing security for the nation's capital and of acting as the Army's official ceremonial unit. This duty includes participating in numerous official ceremonies, maintaining

the vigil at the Tomb of the Unknowns and performing military funeral rites in Arlington National Cemetery.

With respect to the Bicentennial, the 3d Infantry has reorganized the 66-man Commander-in-Chief's Guard, which follows the Color Guard in the Prologue.


The Commander-in-Chief's Guard was the name given General Washington's personal guard company—the first to contain men from all of the colonies. It was not sectional in its composition, as was the rest of the Army at the time.

A further distinction of the Commander-in-Chief's Guard is the time-honored custom by which the unit passes in review with fixed bayonets in all parades.

The Fife and Drum Corps is the final element of the Prologue. This is the only unit of its kind in the Armed Forces. The black tricornered hats, white wigs, vests, breeches and stockings, and the red waistcoats recall the days of the Revolution as the Corps parades in the uniforms of George Washington's Army.

The drum major wears a large fur and leather helmet, known as the British Light Infantry cap. To issue orders to the Corps without voice, he carries an espontoon, once carried by commissioned officers as an infantry weapon.

The 87-man Fife and Drum Corps uses six-hole wood fifes, handmade rope-tensioned drums and buglesreplicas of the instruments used during the war for independence.

5. LONG BEACH MOUNTED POLICE John Downing, President & Marshal Ward Thompson, Captain & Marshal

This posse of 26 matched palominos is appropriately attired for the Bicentennial celebration in red, white and blue western costumes. Heavily trimmed with rhinestones, the red shirts have large white roses appliqued on the back, yoke and sleeves. The trousers are blue, and the ties and hats are white. The 1976 Parade marks the 29th year the Long Beach Mounted Police has ridden in the forefront.

6. BEKINS MOVING AND STORAGE "HAPPY BIRTHDAY, AMERICA"

Moving back through time—Bekins is having a Colonial birthday party. Undoubtedly, the hit of the party is the huge birthday cake. That's enough for Uncle Sam to have a piece of cake a day for 15 years, two months, two weeks and three days! The white mum cake is decorated with bunting of red and white carnations and blue cornflowers, and trimmed with yellow roses. The flames of the white gladiola candles are yellow carnation petals, specially designed to create a flickering effect. The Colonial children are trying to blow out the birthday candles.

8. TOURNAMENT OF ROSES OFFICIAL BAND PASADENA CITY COLLEGE PASADENA, CALIFORNIA

The Pasadena City College Lancer Band is marching as the Official Tournament of Roses Band for the 46th year. The 160-member aggregation wears military style red and white uniforms with satin capes and white shakos. PCC's band is under the direction of Ronald Hoar. Richard Ramsey is the drum major. Throughout the parade the band will play an original Revolutionary War marching song.

9. CITY OF GLENDALE, CALIFORNIA "AMERICA, LET'S SHOW OUR COLORS"





Glendale's 59th Rose Parade entry is a radiant birthday treat complete with glistening candles. The sculptured American patriot, done in cornflowers, shades of gladioli, dock weed and onion seed, keynotes the float as he proudly waves Old Glory. A bridge of stars sweeps gracefully toward the rear, forming an arch. Employing a myriad of flowers, the spiraling, colorful candles rest upon the bridge. The "flickering" flames of the candles are gold and yellow gladiolus petals. Hundreds of whole poinsettia plants adorn the front and rear base of the float.

10. CHESTNUT AND WHITE PINTOS **WESTERN COSTUMES**

HERRIN-PRESTON PARADE FLOATS

A symbolic flag of the United States majestically sweeps the length of this float. The field of stars is suspended on two columns, representing the strength of our nation. The 13 stripes of red carnations and white mums are draped from the galaxy of 50 white mum stars. The deck is a tiered dias in the shape of sculptured eagle wings. Behind the floral-gowned lady is a revolving Seal of the United States. Lavish overlays of white orchids embellish the base with white rose and carnation arrangements resting under the columns.

An oval mirror frame from the period of the signing of the Declaration of Independence surrounds the Royal Court. The carpet of white mums is trimmed in red roses. Seafoam statice forms the blue rim of the frame resting upon a bed of roses. Sculptured roses accent the mirror which is cantilevered for an excellent view of the Royal Court.

14. UNITED STATES MARINE CORPS BAND UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

The 87th Tournament of Roses marks the silver anniversary appearance of a United States Marine Band in the Rose Parade. This 90-man unit was assembled from Marine bases throughout Southern California. The musicians are wearing the traditional Marine dress blues. Under the direction of Chief Warrant Officer Harry L. Bentley, the Marines are known for their precision of cadence and stirring military sound.

15. INTERSTATE BRANDS (DOLLY MADISON CAKES) "THE GREAT AMERICAN PARADE"

From the comic strips to the hearts of Americans, the "Peanuts Gang" has come to the Rose Parade for the third time. Celebrating in the traditional American way—a parade—each Peanuts character is dressed as his favorite American. Leading off is Charlie Brown, the continental soldier; closely followed by Woodstock. Lucy chose to be Betsy Ross and Snoopy is Ben Franklin. In the guise of Uncle Sam is Linus. Snoopy's kite is cleverly cantilevered from the rear tree so it appears to be actually flying.

The two-story Victorian bird houses are lodged in a massive 50-foot tree covered with some 20,000 carina roses. White mums, gladiola and carnation petals decorate the houses. The gardens consist of roses, cattleya orchids, china mums, spider mums and dendrobium orchids.

19. GENEVA MUNICIPAL BAND GENEVA, SWITZERLAND

The 87th-Tournament of Roses proudly welcomes the Geneva Municipal Band, the first musical unit from Europe to participate in the Rose Parade (Known in Switzerland as the Musique Municipale de la Ville de Geneve). Founded in 1863, the Geneva Band is one of Europe's finest groups. Their repertoire ranges from classical music to dixieland. Under the direction of Jacques Duhamel, the members range in age from 17 to 57.

20. SUNKIST GROWERS, INC. "OUR SPECIAL WISH"

Peace, Love and Happiness is Sunkist's "special wish," expressed in a birthday card to America. The three scenes are set in filigree frames of gladiolus and carnation petals, separated by 14-foot rose trees and tropical gardens. Peace is symbolized by a sculptured fountain with running water, set in a garden beside a reflecting pool. A couple sitting in a swing under an orange blossom tree represent love. Happiness is the revolving carousel being enjoyed by children. This is Sunkist's 10th entry.

Graceful trees of camellias, orchids, baby's breath and deflexus fern, drape the pavilion. The boat is solidly covered with shimmering silverleaf. The birds in the cages are flowered with brilliant tropical blossoms. CUNA was the 1975 Queen's Trophy winner.

23. MOUNT VERNON HIGH SCHOOL MARCHING BAND MOUNT VERNON, WASHINGTON

Attired in Colonial-style uniforms, the 103 members of the Mount Vernon High School Marching Band will perform a medley of songs covering the last 200 years (1776-1976). The music was arranged by Don Hannah of Las Vegas, and Nevada's 1972 Composer of the Year. Greg Tiemann is director of the band, which comes to the 87th Tournament of Roses from a year of presentations throughout the State of Washington and Canada.

21. 1 BAY ARABIAN—1 BAY & WHITE PINTO 24. RAND McNALLY & COMPANY "WE, THE PEOPLE"




Throughout the country's 200-year history, "We, the People" have unknowingly recorded our past with our hats. George Washington's hat is also represented, along with the Gibson Girl and the farmer's straw hat. Framing the array is a floral canopy of yellow roses mixed with white cattleya orchids, tapering into garlands of hot pink carnations, pink roses and white orchids.



A replica of the Holy Bible is imposed on the center of the cross and is flowered so as to resemble embossed leather. Used as a bookmark, the rose is made of white mums. The deck under the cantilevered cross is a mass of cattleya orchids.

A 1961 Rose Parade participant, the Red Demons are making a return appearance this year. Recent achievements include participation in the Cotton Bowl Parade and No. 1 ratings at the state music festival for the last 26 years. The 140 Dodge City bandsmen are directed by Carl Schminke. White Stetson hats, silver and blue overlays, silver gauntlets and black trousers complete the uniforms.

Decked out in red poinsettia petals with wheels of yellow gladioli, the antique auto is constantly "dying" amidst clouds of smoke. An aviary of colorful macaws, and ice cream cone and hot dog vendors further adds to the 1904 fair atmosphere.

Celebrating "Freedom for All," Knott's Berry Farm commemorates the signing of the Declaration of Independence. A replica of one of the table tops used in the actual signing provides the unusual base. Maroon ti leaves create the woodtone texture of the table. The white mum Declaration is unrolled on the table revealing the original signers seated in front of Independence Hall. Betsy Ross and George Washington are seated under the quill pen, which is made of pampas grass. Highlighting the festive mood are pinwheels of roses and orchids twirling in the sky.



The largest number of hanging floral arrangements on one float is dramatically presented by the Odd fellows and Rebekahs. The large '200" numerals on each side of the float (decorated with mums, and yellow and gold roses) are set off by embossed stars and perched eagles. The numerals range from 14 to 12 to nine feet in height. The two eagles are covered with leaves, petals and dried materials.

The friendship between Canada and the United states is symbolized with the ceremonial peace pipe. The pipe is a floral replica of those used by the indians of both the Calgary area and the U.S. The pright feathers are a mixture of black croton, white pampas grass and poinsettia petals. Dazzling beads of blue delphinium ornament the center of the feathers. The sculptured horse is covered with white gladiolus petals. Orange calendulas and yellow marigolds make up the brilliant lettering. Actual smoke is being emitted from the peace pipe.

57. ALL-CANADA "SCARLET AND BRASS BAND"

There are two elements included in the All-Canada "Scarlet and Brass Band." The first is the Royal 22nd Regiment ("Vandoos") of Quebec, led by Major Pierret. Their attire is accented by scarlet tunics and black bearskin busbies. Also in scarlet tunics, but with spiked pith helmets is Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry of Calgary, directed by Capt. L. Camplin. The 40 musicians in each group are 20 to 35 years of age.

CITY OF MONTREAL, QUEBEC, CANADA "UNE DOUBLE CELEBRATION"

A dynamic floral fireworks display symbolizes the "double celebration" represented on Montreal's first Rose Parade entry. The cause for dual celebration is 1976—America's Bicentennial year and the year of the Olympic Games in Montreal. The red, white and blue of the fireworks is achieved through the use of white roses, orchids, gladioli and carnations; red rose petals; and blue cornflower, statice and iris. The lettering is painted with white gladioli against a blue floral background.

59. PROVINCE OF QUEBEC, CANADA "THE GREATEST SNOW ON EARTH"

Ice palaces shimmer from atop suspended pathways of snow on this frosty entry from the land of the Winter Carnaval. Greeting Parade visitors is Bonhomme Carnaval, the snowman, who is the master of Quebec during the Carnaval de Quebec each February. Bonhomme's costume weighs in excess of 75 pounds. Iceberg mums are appropriately used for the snow areas and white gladiolus petals, shaded with blue iris, form the ice on the castles. Bordering the pathways are arrangements of white roses, carnations, iris and stock blossoms.

60. ALL-CANADA PIPERS BAND

Dressed in Highland Regalia, five segments make up this unit. The 70-member City of Winnipeg Massed Pipes and Drums is directed by K. A. Stuebing. Master Warrant Officer J. R. Coghill leads the 20-man Cameron Highlanders of Ottawa. The Seaforth Highlanders of Canada with 10 bandsmen is directed by M. D. Wilson. Heading the 10-man Canadian Scottish Regiment of Victoria is G. S. Puritch. The Nova Scotia Highlanders is a 20-man unit.

61. PROVINCE OF NOVA SCOTIA, CANADA "FREEDOM AND FRIENDSHIP"



HERRIN-PRESTON PARADE FLOATS

A sweeping scroll of white mums, representing a parched maritime map, keynotes Nova Scotia's entry. With shipping and other sea-related industry being a major source of revenue in Nova Scotia, her parade entries are usually sea oriented. Huge sculptured rose blossoms, covered with gladiolus petals, together with cascades of roses, accent the scrolls. The scene portrays the struggle for freedom shared by the United States and Nova Scotia—and their resulting friendship. Nova Scotia was the 1975 International Trophy winner.

Outstanding band members from schools of the Los Angeles Unified School District are making, by popular demand, their fourth consecutive appearance in the Rose Parade. The 210 musicians are complemented by three banner carriers, two drum majors, and three twirlers. Blue trousers, white coats, and white shakos with red trim comprise the groups' outfits. The directors are Don Dustin, Frank Harris, Ed Hughes, Richard Quan and Bob Williams.

65. CITY OF LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA "A PRESENT FROM OUR PAST"





After winning the Southwest Missouri State University Show Band Contest three consecutive years, the trophy was retired to the "Marching Jays." Director of the 218-member unit is Jerry Hoover.

69. CITY OF ARCADIA, CALIFORNIA "PROUD AS A PEACOCK—200 YEARS"

In a most appropriate gesture, Arcadia has chosen to salute the Bicentennial with its city bird—the peacock. The stylized 12-foot peacocks of white carnation petals are gracefully perched in rose-covered trees. The sculptured trees slowly revolve beneath a delicate canopy of roses and carnations. The precisely timed gear system allows the rotating branches to mesh, but never touch. The base of the float is a garden of roses, carnations and cattleya orchids. This marks Arcadia's 30th Rose Parade appearance.



A stunning bouquet of roses . . . to America . . . from FTD is a most appropriate birthday gift. There are 36 finely sculptured roses in all, varying in size from one-and-a-half-foot buds to five-foot blossoms. The petals of 40,000 gladioli in six hues are used in the subtle shading of the beautiful roses. To create a natural look, each petal was individually glued into place. In all, 15,000 roses, amongst baby's breath, form the soft depth of the bouquet as it rests upon a delicately textured doily.

74. LONG PRAIRIE HIGH SCHOOL BAND "MINNESOTA'S MARCHING M'BASSADORS" LONG PRAIRIE, MINNESOTA

Minnesota's 1975 Band of the Year, the Marching M'Bassadors comes to the Rose Parade with an impressive record. Since 1968, the band has won 29 consecutive parade firsts and superior concert ratings. Wearing new Bicentennial uniforms, the 127-member unit is led by a 20-piece fife and drum corps. The director is Raymond Gove. The high school's enrollment is just under 450 with the community population at 2,400.

75. MINNEAPOLIS AQUATENNIAL-ST. PAUL WINTER CARNIVAL, MINNESOTA "THE NATIVE AMERICAN"

A rich and artistic tribute to the native American—the American Indian—comes from Minnesota. In the center is a reproduction of a painted shield of the Sioux. Carnation and gladiolus petals, cornflower, red ti leaves and Dutch iris effect the painted surface. Lavish cascades of gold and yellow roses fall from the cantilevered portions of the Chippewa belts. The Sioux and the Chippewa were not only among the first Americans, but also the first Minnesotans.



In the front, scenes of lunar exploration and a scale-model covered wagon keynote the journey through time. The entry is designed, built, financed and decorated by Downey-area volunteers.

80. LOS ALTOS HIGH SCHOOL MARCHING BAND HACIENDA HEIGHTS, CALIFORNIA

Directed by Danny Wagner, this talented group of 176 musicians has for the last two years been the only undefeated field band in Southern California. The perfect record covers seven different tournaments. The auxiliary units include 11 flag and nine letter carriers, six with drill rifles and three majorettes. "Yankee Doodle Dandy" will be one of Los Altos' featured songs for the 1976 Rose Parade.

Brightly designed firecrackers form an appropriately loud salute to our nation's traditional birthday, the Fourth of July. Having lit the fuse, the sculptured drum major accidentally touches off the firecrackers with his match as he raises his hands to his ears. This causes flashy spinning and bursting of the gaily colored firecrackers. Covering the sparks on the wicks are carnation, gladiolus, vandas and gypsophilia petals. The firecrackers are made up of mum and orchid petals. The entry marks the 45th year of participation by Los Angeles County.

Cleverly animated, this whimsical scene is of a young boy and his dog "Sam." As the young cowboy eats his triple-decker cone, the crowd distracts him. The flowers are mainly mums, roses, carnations, ti leaves and pampas grass. The unit is designed, financed and decorated by students of Cal Poly's Pomona and San Luis Obispo campuses.

Western Airlines was the 1975 President's Trophy winner for the best use of roses in the Commercial Division.

Known as "The Pride of Northern California," the Armijo Super Band has earned the title with some 15 grand sweepstakes and 16 first places in the last three years. Directed by Ray Lindsey, the unit consists of 18 tall flag bearers, 24 banner carriers, and 108 musicians. The auxiliary units are in white and black tunics. The musicians have uniforms of navy coats and trousers accented by a white breast plate and 14-inch busby.

The massive yellow and orange base (basically mums and some 15,000 roses) sets off the detail of the sculpture. Poinsettia petals paint the stagecoach, with wheels of gold gladiolus petals. San Francisco was the Grand Marshal's Trophy winner in both 1974 and 1975.






FESTIVAL ARTISTS

A playful minuteman re-creates the historic "shot heard 'round the world" in commemoration of the Battle of Concord (April 19, 1775) when the American Revolution became reality. The animated minuteman will pull the lanyard of the toy cannon. Some 75,000 blue cornflowers were especially grown for his trousers. The gun crew are humans wearing oversize floral heads as they load and prime the cannon. Confetti and colored smoke—which just may have an aroma similar to that of a famous seasoning salt—will fill the air with each bang.

97. SALVATION ARMY TOURNAMENT BAND LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA

Having first marched in the 1920 Rose Parade, the Salvation Army Band is the oldest continual band participant. Directed by Harry Stillwell, Jr., the 84 musicians play tunes either composed or arranged by members of the organization. Most of the bandsmen's instruments were made in the Corps' London shops. Uniforms are maroon tunics over blue trousers with blue caps. The Salvation Army and its bands is 110 years old.



Congratulating America on her 200th birthday, Mexico presents this artistic design symbolic of her own culture. The feathered serpents, composed of carnation petals, silverleaf, dusty miller and white mums, are replicas of those found at the Mayan complex at Chichen Itza. Resting atop stylized Mexican designs, the serpents provide the float's only supports. Suspended from a bridge of cascading roses and orchids is a garden of rich, tropical plants and a costumed senorita. Mexico was the 1975 Isabella Coleman award winner for the best use of color harmony.

The red stripes are roses; the bed of blue, statice and cornflower; and the stars are made of mums, accented by white phalaenopsis orchids.

The complex detail of the house is painted with petals of various flowers. In the gardens around the house are potted plants and flower cuttings. Stylized trees of white mums are draped with cascades of pink roses. The high wheeler is an antique, restored and decorated with flowers. Doves, feathered with carnation petals, fly over to complete the nostalgic scene.

BICENTENNIAL COMMISSION OF PENNSYLVANIA "VALLEY FORGE"



HERRIN-PRESTON PARADE FLOATS

A snowy winter scene from the pages of Pennsylvania history is re-created. This is Valley Forge, the winter quarters of George Washington's army in 1777-78. Washington is mounted on his horse with a flag bearer behind him. On the rear island of the float is a group of continental soldiers. The trees are actual bark, with white mums creating the snowy appearance. The trees on the base of the float are Boston ferns and other forest plants. This is Pennsylvania's first Rose Parade appearance.

Revolutionary costumes of black and gold, complete with tricornered hats, are worn by the 185 members of the Patriot Band. The band has also made major parade appearances at Miami's Orange Bowl, Ontario's (Canada) Niagara Blossom and the National Cherry Blossom Festival in Washington, D.C. The shine on his boots is from black croton leaves. Continuing the action are brightly colored, free spinning pinwheels with dangling floral streamers.

The Burbank All-City Band has been a biennial parade participant since 1966. A combined unit from Burbank's high schools, the band is led by Robert Rose of John Burroughs High School and William Kuzma of Burbank High School. The 130 band members are augmented by 12 banner and 10 flag carriers, two drum majors and two majorettes. White fur shakos with black and red tassels, which are a foot high, accent the modified West Point uniforms.

109. CITY OF BURBANK, CALIFORNIA "LET'S CELEBRATE AMERICA'S NATURAL BEAUTY"




SELF-DECORATED

The butterfly is made of pink and yellow gladiolus petals and the deer is a variety of seeds and petals. Burbank won the 1975 Founders' Trophy for the most outstanding self-decorated entry.

The "floralgraphs" are vivid pictures composed of gladioli, carnations, mums, cornflowers, ti leaves and seeds. This is ASCE's first Rose Parade entry.

114. McDONALD'S ALL-AMERICAN HIGH SCHOOL BAND THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

This outstanding band includes two musicians from each of the 50 states and the District of Columbia. Each state's finest band members are nominated by band directors and chosen on the basis of ability. Directing McDonald's All-American Band is Paul Lavalle of the Radio City Music Hall in New York City. Each musician wears the uniform of his own school with a McDonald's tunic overlay and cap.

In the rear, two Spanish senoritas stand beneath a trellis entwined with white carnation petals. Draping the trellis is a languid tree with foliage from thousands of roses and carnation blossoms. This is Alhambra's 49th Rose Parade appearance.

The large shaggy dog leading the parade was named "Woofle" as the result of a national contest for IHOP employees. Covered with pampas grass, "Woofle" is pulling a toy wagon full of kids waving flags and holding solid rose balloons. The tin pan drummer is followed by a young fire chief in a racy red fire engine bringing up the rear.

124. BICENTENNIAL WAGON TRAIN 4 WAGONS—15 HORSES

In tribute to the nation's 200th anniversary the wagons are rolling again. The Bicentennial Wagon Train Pilgrimage is a replay of history—in reverse. This time they are traveling eastward, back to Pennsylvania. A train of covered wagons, one from each state, will cross the country following historic trails and wagon routes as closely as possible. This particular wagon train continues directly from the Tournament of Roses Parade onto a designated route across the country. The Pilgrimage ends July 4, 1976, at Valley Forge Park, Pennsylvania.

Rose Parade, will be on display for a "second look" following the Tournament's 87th festival on New Year's morning.

A MUSICAL FLAVOR FROM CANADA



The No. 1 team in the nation, Ohio State (11-0), will be back in Pasadena to face UCLA (8-2-1) for "all the roses" on New Year's afternoon, 1976. Kickoff is at 2 p.m. (PST). Surprisingly, these two teams have never met in a Rose Bowl; however, the game will still be a "rematch," as Ohio State defeated the Bruins, 41-20, in an early-season game in Los Angeles.

A victory over UCLA would also assure Coach W. W.


"Woody" Hayes of a fourth national championship, but Coach Dick Vermeil's Bruins can look to history and 1966 when UCLA defeated then No. 1 Michigan State, 14-12, in a Rose Bowl thriller.

The Big Ten champion Buckeyes are making their fourth consecutive appearance in the classic, fifth in six years and 10th over-all, recording five wins in the previous nine games. The Pacific-8 co-champion Bruins are 1-5 in the bowl, and haven't visited Pasadena since that big day in 1966.

The Big Ten, too, is in command of the 29-year bowl competition between the two conferences, winning 18 of the contests. The Rose Bowl Game itself began in 1902.





UCLA BRUINS

UCLA is hopeful that Rose Bowl history will repeat itself in 1976.

It was just 10 years ago that the Bruins pulled off one of the biggest upsets in the 62-year history of the game, defeating the No. 1 ranked Spartans of Michigan State, 14-12. Equally satisfying was the fact that Michigan State had beaten the Bruins in the season opener, 13-3, and was an overwhelming favorite in the Rose Bowl.

New Year's day, 1976, will again find the Bruins involved in a "rematch," and as in 1966—the opponent is ranked No. 1 in the nation, besides holding a win over UCLA.

This time it's Ohio State—a 41-20 victor over the Bruins in the fourth week of the 1975 season. The only consolation for UCLA was a second half rally which brought the Bruins from a 38-7 deficit. Their final total represented the most points allowed by the Buckeyes this season.

In only his second season as head coach, Dick Vermeil fashioned an 8-2-1 season record, a Pacific-8 Conference football co-championship (6-1) with California (Berkeley), and a bowl-clinching 25-22 victory over rival USC. Despite defeating California, 28-14, UCLA still had to beat the Trojans for a trip to Pasadona

The victory will be savored—especially since it was only the first win in five years and the second in the last decade over USC.

Along the way, the Bruins were defeated by conference foe Washington and tied by the Air Force. Vermeil's Veer T offense, expertly quarterbacked by senior John Sciarra, averaged more than 300 yards rushing and 29 points per game.

In the process, junior halfback Wendell Tyler set a one-season UCLA rushing record of 1,256 yards. Sciarra was only seven points shy of the conference scoring title, and had more than 1,000 yards passing with a 49 percent completion average.

OHIO STATE BUCKEYES

Brian Baschnagel, Pat Curto, Tim Fox, Cornelius Greene, Archie Griffin and Ken Kuhn have a lot in common. They're all members of Ohio State's football team, and in four years have helped the Buckeyes compile a 40-4-1 won-lost-tied mark.

Equally significant is the fact that the six have never spent Christmas in Columbus, but in Pasadena as freshman-to-senior members of Ohio State's Rose Bowl teams.

That distinction is a Rose Bowl first—a record to be cherished when the Buckeyes of Coach W. W. "Woody" Hayes face UCLA in the 62nd Rose Bowl on New Year's day, 1976.

Hayes, who is coaching his eighth Rose Bowl team and the university's 10th, comes to Pasadena with a portfolio full of 1975 accomplishments:

- . No. 1 team in the nation.
- Unbeaten in 11 straight games.
- Big Ten Conference Champions.
- A Big Ten record fourth straight Rose Bowl, which also ties him with USC's four straight (1967-1970) in the Rose Bowl record book.
- A convincing 41-20 early-season win over his 1976 opponent—UCLA.
- 213 victories in 25 seasons in the Big Ten along with four Rose Bowl triumphs.

The Buckeyes were superlative in 1975, scoring 374 points, while allowing only 79. Greene (1974 Rose Bowl Player of the Game), Griffin (1974 Heisman Trophy winner and a record 31 straight games of 100 yards or more rushing) and fullback Pete Johnson (Big Ten record of 25 touchdowns) were instrumental, but it took a masterful comeback by the entire team to earn a trip to California. Trailing 14-7 and without a first down in more than 30 minutes, Ohio State scored twice in the final four minutes to defeat Michigan, 21-14, for the Big Ten title and bowl bid. Hayes called the win "the greatest comeback in my 25 years of coaching."

He'll start his 26th year on New Year's day!

PICTURE THE PARADE!

Action, color, people aplenty. Everyone loves a parade, and anyone with a camera can take this parade home in color snapshots, slides or movies.

Here are some tips from Kodak photo experts to help make your photography as spectacular as your subject:

 Pick a camera position along the parade route where the sun is at your back and you enjoy a clear view of the line of march.

 Prepare to photograph outstanding parade units by referring to the order of march in this program.

 Load your camera with color film and keep track of how many pictures or how much movie footage you have left to shoot. If you run out of film, look for film vendors along the parade route.

 Picture a poster, flyer or banner announcing the parade and its theme to use as a title for your print set, slide show or

- Include spectators in the foreground of your pictures and movies to help "frame" floats, band units and equestrian teams. But be sure the spectators are looking at the parade, not the camera!
- Occasionally direct your attention at the action around you on the sidelines.

For Snapshooters Only

 Advance your film after every shot and you always will be ready for that special spur-of-the-moment picture opportunity

that only happens once.

 When you spot a likely picture subject, take a moment to compose your picture in the viewfinder. Sometimes, if you wait a moment, a busy setting will clear up a bit or your main subject will move closer to the camera and automatically eliminate distracting background.

Single out a special subject by picturing it from a low

angle against a blue sky backdrop.

 Picture parade units as they move directly toward or away from you or when they stop or mark time while other units perform.

 Pan by centering a moving subject in your viewfinder and following it slowly, steadily, pivoting from the waist. Squeeze the shutter release at an opportune moment, while continuing to pan, and you'll get a relatively sharp picture of your subject against an artfully blurred background.

 Movement can be part of an exciting still picture so don't wait for all action to stop before you shoot. The blur of a twirling baton or of prancing horses' hooves can add to a picture's impact as long as the respective drum major or

equestrians are in focus.

 Hold your camera steady and squeeze your shutter release gently every time you shoot. A steady camera hand is especially important if you are using a telephoto lens or a Kodak Tele-Instamatic camera at its telephoto setting.

- Use your camera's telephoto setting to feature float riders or to single out interesting float details.
- Take three-quarter views of approaching floats. And if your camera takes a rectangular picture, use the horizontal format for side or three-quarter views of floats and switch to the vertical format for front views of oncoming floats or individual band or equestrian team members.

For Movie-Makers Only

 If your movie camera accepts both Kodachrome 40 and Kodak Ektachrome 160 movie films (type A), match your film choice to the weather. On a bright, sunny day, use Kodachrome 40 film with daylight filter in place. On an overcast day, choose Kodak Ektachrome 160 movie film, type A, with daylight filter, or Kodak Ektachrome 160 movie film, type G, with no filter, for best results at lower light levels.

Treat your parade movie as a whole. Each scene should

add something new and interesting.

 Vary scene length and camera-to-subject distance. Film only as long as a subject seems interesting and punctuate your parade production with spectator reaction.

 Hold your camera still most of the time, allowing your subjects to move through the camera's field of view.

 Camera movement should be kept to a minimum. Pan slowly, steadily, pivoting from the waist-only when the urge to follow the action is irresistible.

 If your camera has a zoom lens, use the telephoto setting for close-ups. The wide-angle setting can help you establish the setting in which the individual scenes take place.

 Record the sounds of bands as well as spectators with a super 8 camera, such as a Kodak Ektasound movie camera, capable of recording "live" sound.

 Remember to film each sound scene a little longer than you would a silent scene because sound records slightly behind the image on the film.

Finishing Touches

 Take your camera to the Victory Park Post Parade area to fill in close-up details and to add candids of participants to your parade coverage.

 Look for an appropriate closing shot—the aftermath of the parade, a bedraggled spectator, a lonely street vendor,

a discarded banner or sign.

Edit your parade photography before you share it.

If you have a projector capable of recording sound, add your own commentary to the "live" sound after processing.

Have super 8 silent film striped and add appropriate music.

Share your parade snapshots with someone far away by ordering multiple print sets at the time you take your film in for developing and printing.

• Make this year's photo coverage the first installment in your personal record of the annual Tournament of Roses parade.
