




FROM A SIMPLE BEGINNING

One hundred and eighty-five years ago, on September 4, 1781, a weary company of travelers—forty-four men, women and children, colonists from Mexico—camped along the river called the Porciúncula. These first settlers, known as the "pobladores", whose mission was the founding of El Pueblo de Nuestra Señora la Reina de Los Angeles, as planned by Governor Felipe de Neve, had reached their destination.

The naming of this park-like area in the heart of the City of Los Angeles, El Paseo de los Pobladores de Los Angeles, the "Walk of the Settlers of Los Angeles," acknowledges the contributions of these first citizens who could not have known that they would found what was destined to be one of the largest cities in the country.

The celebration of the completion of the first phase of El Paseo de los Pobladores de Los Angeles reflects the endeavors of many visionary citizens of later years in our city's history who recognized the need for a centralized complex of city and county buildings to house government services for this, the most rapidly growing area in the world today.

Early in the twentieth century, plans were considered which included a comprehensive proposal for a civic center. For various reasons, including lack of agreement on an acceptable plan and methods of funding, the advent of the Depression, followed by World War II, progress towards the development of the civic center was delayed until 1963 when work commenced on the first phase of El Paseo de los Pobladores de Los Angeles.

When the three-phase construction is completed, the mall will extend from Grand Avenue on the west to Spring Street on the east, making this civic center for government and culture unsurpassed in modern history in its beauty and usefulness for present and future citizens.



A TRIBUTE TO ARTHUR J. WILL

Perhaps more than any other man, Arthur J. Will was responsible for formulating many of the ideas of design and construction of the modern concept of the Los Angeles Civic Center. It was he who envisioned the transformation of a network of civic structures into an administrative and cultural center of utility and beauty. Arthur J. Will was indeed, the driving force, the catalyst, who brought together vision and action.

His passing denied him the opportunity to witness his dream become a reality. As a symbol of his determination and drive for the development of the Civic Center, the Arthur J. Will Memorial Fountain was included in the plans for El Paseo de los Pobladores de Los Angeles.


The commemorative plaque at the foot of the fountain is appropriately inscribed as follows:
