Early in 1927 Robert Louis Stevenson Branch Library moved from its outgrown Whittier Boulevard headquarters into a brand new building one block north at 803 Spence Street and in honor of this, February has been officially named 30th anniversary month of the library, according to L. A. City Librarian Harold L. Hamill.

The handsome \$37,652 brick building was designed to harmonize with neighboring public buildings and is in keeping with the construction of nearby Robert Louis Stevenson Junior High School.

Mrs. Lillian Nicholas, central northeast regional librarian and acting librarian for R. L. Stevenson says that the area presents a distinct challenge to the staff to offer the type of service needed in the community, and she adds, "we believe with the proper stimulation our patrons can realize this improved service."

Supervisors Air Disposal Plan

Disposal of combustible rubbish by baling it into bundles and hauling it to desert areas has been proposed to the Board of Supervisors by Supervisor Herbert C. Legg. Testing of the baling process by county administrative and engineering authorities to ascertain feasibility of the suggestion, was ordered by the Supervisors, on Legg's motion.

Improvements For Park Set

Plans and specifications to improve the Atlantic Avenue Park swimming pool and bathhouse were approved by the Board of Supervisors last week.

Estimated cost of the improvements was set as \$87,325. Work included in the project provides for complete heating of the bathhouse and pool, rehabilitation of the bathhouse, partial radiant heating of the pool decks, new restrooms, a new pool water distribution system, and a concrete block wind wall, Ford said.

Explaining his idea in detail, Legg said that a considerable number of trucks which bring hay from desert ranches to city areas now return to the desert empty and could haul baled rubbish to desert disposal sites.

In addition, he contended, ore cars from the Kaiser steel mills at Fontana could transport such rubbish while enroute empty to pick up ore from desert mines.

Supervisorial Chairman John Anson Ford described Legg's motion as being "directly in line with the county's long range need for meeting the rubbish disposal problem", but contended it did not eliminate the immediate need to provide rubbish disposal sites close in to the metropolitan area.

Legg said his suggestion was designed to help prepare for handling the great mass of combustible rubbish which would have to be disposed of when the County Air Pollution Control District's ban on use of backyard incinerators goes into effect October 1.
